Three Singaporean students win British Council's IELTS Scholarships to pursue their dreams of studying overseas

Top three students in the East Asia region each receives £25,000 scholarship

18 August 2014 Singapore – Studying overseas has been a dream for many students in Singapore. With an aim to connect people with learning opportunities, the British Council launched the IELTS Scholarship in 2012 (in Singapore) and, since then, it has supported a total of 13 students (in Singapore) in entering universities worldwide, including the UK, USA and Australia. This year, three scholars would be added to the list, each of whom received a scholarship valued at SGD 5000 at the award presentation ceremony held at British Council, Napier Road on 29 August 2014. To celebrate IELTS's 25th anniversary, the British Council also awarded three students in the East Asia region with scholarships of £25,000 each, who will be entering their dream universities overseas to pursue further education.

"Like with all other art forms, (with theatre) you think you're going to be a struggling artist and that you're going to starve. I guess (the British Council IELTS Scholarship) would help a lot in terms of my tuition fees. "We are pleased that our wide international acceptance and the IELTS scholarship are helping more students in East Asia to pursue further study in different parts of the world."

This year also marks the 25th Anniversary of IELTS. To celebrate the occasion, the British Council extended the IELTS scholarship to 12 cities across East Asia, awarding three regional

scholarships to top scholars in the region. Two of them will be pursuing further study in the UK, including Sooyoun Kim from Korea, who will study the Masters of Arts in Museum and Artefact Studies at Durham University in the UK, and Wongsathorn Jiraphanvanich from Thailand, who will attend the University of Cambridge in the UK for MPhil and PhD in Chemical Engineering.

The third regional IELTS scholar, Thandar Aung from Myanmar, will be making her way to Berlin in Germany to study at the Institute of Tropical Medicine and International Health of Charité Universitätsmedizin for the Masters of Science in International Health. With an ambition on contributing and leading the health sector reform process in her country, she said, "I would like to thank the British Council for the IELTS scholarship and I certainly believe that my Master studies in International Health will equip me with the necessary knowledge and skills of the industry. I hope this scholarship scheme will continue to inspire many generations to come."

As an IELTS official test centre, the British Council provides full support in preparing students in taking IELTS exams, including a 30-hour free online training for registered students and the access to different preparation materials. (1) About International English Language Testing System (IELTS)

IELTS is the International English Language Testing System, the world's most popular English language proficiency test with two million tests taken in the last year. Over 9,000 organizations trust and accept IELTS as a secure, valid and reliable indicator of true to life ability to communicate in English for education, immigration and professional accreditation. IELTS is jointly owned by British Council, IDP: IELTS Australia and Cambridge English Language Assessment.

About the test

Candidates are tested in listening, reading, writing and speaking. All tests are scored on a banded system from 1 (the lowest) through to 9 (the highest possible band score).

IELTS offers a choice of two versions, to serve both academic and non-academic purposes. **IELTS Academic module** measures English language proficiency needed for an academic, higher learning environment. The tasks and texts are accessible to all test-takers, irrespective of their subject focus. **IELTS General Training module** measures English language proficiency in a practical, everyday context. The tasks and texts reflect both workplace and social situations. The General Training module is suitable for immigration purposes to Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the United Kingdom.
