



## BRITISH COUNCIL X MUSICITY SINGAPORE The Architecture of Sound

CITIES ARE A LOT LIKE PEOPLE. EACH ONE HAS ITS OWN BEAT, ITS OWN STYLE, ITS OWN PERSONALITY, AND OF COURSE, ITS OWN SOUND. CITIES ALL SIGH, SPEAK, SING – ONE JUST NEEDS TO PAY ATTENTION. AND THAT'S EXACTLY WHAT MUSICITY IS SO GOOD AT NOTICING. AFTER LENDING MUSIC CAPITALS LIKE LONDON AND TOKYO THEIR OWN UNIQUE SOUNDTRACKS, THE INITIATIVE, ALONGSIDE PARTNERS THE BRITISH COUNCIL, HAS SINCE SET ITS SIGHTS ON OUR URBAN ISLAND. WITH AN INVIGORATING GOULASH OF MODERNIST ARCHITECTURE AND TRADITIONAL LANDMARKS, THE LION CITY PRESENTS A WELCOME CHALLENGE – WHICH IS WHY THEY'VE SOUGHT THE HOMEGROWN EXPERTISE AND EXPERIENCE OF THESE SEVEN SONIC SPIRITS.

SINGAPOREAN MUSICIANS SONICBRAT, JASON TAN (OCTOVER), DJ KOFLOW, I AM DAVID SPARKLE, MUON, THE ANALOG GIRL AND COSA NOSTRA WERE ALL COMMISSIONED TO COMPOSE ORIGINAL MUSIC INSPIRED BY VARIOUS ICONIC SPACES, EACH VALUED FOR THEIR ARTISTIC, CULTURAL AND HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE. THIS MERGING OF DESIGN, MUSIC AND MEMORY AIMS TO OPEN UP OUR EYES AND EARS BY ADDING INTANGIBLE DIMENSIONS TO OUR CITY'S TANGIBLE FABRIC. DIRECTOR NICK LUSCOMBE AND CREATIVE STRATEGIST SIMON JORDAN MAY HAVE CONCEPTUALISED THIS MULTISENSORY PLATFORM HALFWAY AROUND THE WORLD, BUT THEIR IDEA HAS SPREAD FAR AND WIDE – AND OUR ECCENTRIC IDENTITY MIGHT BE MUSICITY'S MOST INTERESTING VENTURE YET.



Eclectic composer Darren Ng aka Sonicbrat has crafted numerous pieces for local theatre, international film, contemporary dance performances and various arts installations. Well-known for his use of field recordings with electro-acoustic apparatus and his DIY improvisations on hand-made instruments, the sought after sound artist has been picked to showcase his multi-instrumentalist works in stages as varied as the Hanoi Sound Stuff Festival in 2009 and the Barcelona edition of Red Bull Music Academy in 2008. This time though, his art is firmly steeped on home soil as Sonicbrat shapes his music to the shape of Gardens by the Bay.

#### Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...

It was quite an interesting and humbling experience for me. I got to visit Gardens by the Bay as the source of inspiration for my track. After that, it was a rather contemplative process where I sat at the piano for hours with my eyes closed, meditating about the plants and their subtle movements in the wind. I hit the record button and started to improvise based on these thoughts and feelings, emulating the quiet plants, letting the music play on, on its own. Working with Mara Carlyle on this track was a really wonderful experience as well.

## Tell us what your neighbourhood is like and how you're inspired by its surroundings...

One of my favourite spots in Singapore is Caimhill Arts Centre at 126 Caimhill Rise. It is a quiet little spot, with a preserved heritage building. The reason I'm attached to this place is because I've been working with The Finger Players, a theatre company, for the past nine years as an Associate Sound Artist and Music Composer. It is a place where I've grown up artistically. I do have a lot of nostalgic memories of the place — and nostalgia is inspirational as well.

## If you were asked to create a playlist for this spot, what 10 tracks will you pick?

I'll play none and let the place speak for itself. It is very quiet as it is from the distant bustling Caimhill Road and Scotts Road traffic. Instead of a playlist, I would say the place makes music on its own. It is occooned by the rustling whispers of tree leaves laughing to the impish wind; curious birds singing to the shady afternoons, fluttering away with the occasional echoes of footsteps on concrete stairs. This is juxtaposed with the sounds of construction sites where new homes are being built, thus coming together like an aural canvas on modemity.





jason tan (octover)

Octover's been making waves lately, and you can count us amongst the many who are eagerly awaiting their forthcoming debut album via Syndicate's recording arm. The team-up between prolific crooner Vanessa Fernandez (Vandetta), and pioneering electronic producer Jason Tan, is an inspired one, managing to weave together bass-draped trip hop with beautiful vocals into one helluva hypnotic package. Jason Tan is the brilliant mind behind those beats, and now he's also using his talents to craft an electronic blueprint for The Art Science Museum.

#### Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...

It was a great experience. Having met Jon Hopkins for the first time and making a track together was really nice. There were a lot of musical similarities between the two of us. Making the piece out of ambient recording from The Art Science Museum was really interesting. I don't think either of us knew how the piece would turn out, we had very little control over environmental sound and there were very little musical structure when you use an ambient recording. A lot of time was spent on transforming and re-synthesising the recorded sounds and putting them together as a singularity.

#### Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...



## Tell us what your neighbourhood is like and how you're inspired by its surroundings...



i am david sparkle

After wowing gargantuan stages on both local (Good Vibrations, ZoukOut) and international (SXSW) scales, I Am David Sparkle can count themselves as one of Singapore's proudest musical offerings. But besides their live accomplishments, their instrumental intricacy and post-rock power can also be found on a pair of seminal Singaporean albums called *This Is The New* and *Swords*, both released via KittyWu. We recently got to know their story through a moving documentary (Ignore All Detour Signs) chronicling their struggles behind their US tour, but now it's time for them to tell a different tale through a sonic interpretation of the Asian Civilisations Museum.

#### Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...

It has been nice to be even considered in this project, let alone participate in it. We've always wanted to score music for projects and this project was the perfect opportunity. The people involved have been a pleasure to work with, the support and platforms provided for our peers and ourselves have been amazing, and it is a welcoming alternative to the 'paying you by exposure' mentality that has been plaguing our community for quite a while.

The newly settled outfit will now will lend a bit of that shadowy magic to Musicity to compose a piece about the Esplanade.

## Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...

Nick: It's been an honour to be part of it and get the opportunity to contextualize our music within a different paradigm of relations than that which it usually functions with or as. Working alongside really talented local contemporaries and knowing that all this is not just operating within a local cultural context, but a global one as well, really is inspiring.

Jordan: Playing in Gardens By The Bay is definitely a landmark performance in the aesthetic department. I feel that the concept of composing music inspired by real physical places is a great vehicle to spark creativity.

Ren: It's been dope (lots of it).



## the analog girl

Having been hailed by outlets like CNN and TIME Magazine as one of Asia's premiere artists, one could forgive The Analog Girl for taking it a little easier. But letting up simply isn't in her DNA. Hot off the best record yet, Tonight Your Love, the ethereal Analog Girl is still relentlessly perfecting and promoting her edgy craft. She's winning hearts and minds everywhere from Night Festival to New York City, all in the name of good music. And for Musicity, she's been tasked to infuse her dreamy and daring electronica into the historic Hong San See Temple.

#### Describe your British Council x Musicity Singapore experience...

I was immediately drawn to the Hong San See Temple, which translates to the 'Temple on Phoenix Hill'. The sculpture of a carp swimming upstream and transforming into a dragon spoke volumes to me as it was a beautiful thing to see, and its perseverance was something I drew inspiration from. So, my track "Like Dragons" reminds us that we all have it in us to overcome all adversities and to accomplish whatever we set out to do. I also worked for the first time with the Singapore Chinese Orchestra, and the juxtaposition of my synthesized beats with their classical organic sounds makes this a breakthrough.

## Tell us what your neighbourhood is like and how you're inspired by its surroundings...

I grew up in East Coast, right next to the beach so I had palm trees and blue skies on most days. At night, it is perfect for a drive, to soak in the sea breeze and nightlights. Living by the coast gives me a sense of freedom, like I can travel beyond horizons, both literally and figuratively. This connection with space and exploration creates dreams and from there, music.

## cosa nostra



We like grimy places. So anywhere that has been untouched by the nation's fixation on "upgrading" works for us. That means some parts of Little India and Chinatown, or Geylang. We feel that these neighbourhoods have more character, and it's 100% more real than Marina Bay. We have already lost Bugis and most of Arab Street in our opinion, and it's just a matter of time before other places fade away to make room for sparkling new buildings with giant LED facades.
