In tune to museum

New project lets you plug into specially created music to guide you through seven iconic places

f a national monument could make music, how would it sound? A new project called Musicity may hold the answer. The project lets you listen to tunes and

iconic places here, including three national monuments. All you need is a smartphone to stream the tracks at each location.

You can also take a Saturday bus tour to the three monuments: Asian Civilisations Museum, Singapore Art Museum and Hong San See Temple.

Seven Singaporean acts and two British ones were commissioned to produce the site-specific music, including local band I Am David Sparkle and English singer-songwriter Mara Carlyle.

Instrumental post-rock band I Am David Spar-

kle's Walking Through Walls at the Asian Civilisations Museum, for instance, is supposed to embody walking through the building, says frontman Amran Khamis, 35.

"The title alludes to the ability to transcend physical limitations, much like if one were to float through the museum's hidden spaces," he adds.

tra's World Class, recorded in the building's former chapel, guides you through the former St Joseph's Institution boys' school. "We wanted to capture our reaction to the building's evolution," says Kevin Guoh, 34, half of the duo. The result is a hypnotic, droning house piece influenced by German electronic music pioneers Kraftwerk.

Organised by the British Council, Musicity is in conjunction with annual architecture festival Archifest, on until Oct 31.

The public project, launched on Oct 3 and running until the end of next month, aims to offer a multi-sensory experience.

Says Dr Sarah Meisch, director of arts at British Council Singapore: "By experiencing the monu-

ments via contemporary tracks of music, we hope Musicity will encourage people to interact with the

architectural spaces in a new way."

Singapore is the third city to launch Musicity, after London in 2010 and Tokyo in March this year.

BBC Radio 3 broadcaster and Musicity founder Nick Luscombe selected the British artists involved, with feedback from the British Council. Music producer Cherry Chan, who is part of audio-visual collective Syndicate, helped pick the Singapore artists.

"Artists were selected on the basis of their soundscapes specially composed for seven musical artistry, originality and performance achievements," says Dr Meisch.

"We feel that they provide a good representation of the original music coming from very creative artists in Singapore."

The Preservation of Monuments Board, a partner in the project, will conduct a bus tour of Asian Civilisations Museum in Empress Place, Singapore Art Museum in Bras Basah Road and Hong San See Temple in Mohamed Sultan Road tomorrow and on Oct 27.

The board is incorporating music into its tour of

the monuments for the first time, says its director Jean Wee.

"We hope to use this new medium to attract new and younger audiences to the buildings, and hopefully inspire them to look at these monuments in a new light," she says.

Tour participants will learn about the history and architectural significance of each monument, and how they inspired the commissioned music pieces.

Mei Wong, better known by her stage name The Analog Girl, was inspired by a carving of a carp transforming into a dragon on one of the Hong San See Temple's pillars. The image is based on ancient Asian mythology of the carp that resisted all odds to swim upstream and was rewarded for its perserverance. "This perseverance was also seen in the people who built the temple and kept it going since the 1900s," explains Wong, 39, on the genesis of her piece Like Dragons for the temple.

"I translated the spirit of the building into a score that is both uplifting and transformative, by introducing crescendos and drawing out emotions from the orchestra's musicians."
