Week 2: Project Planet – Our Changing World (1 to 5 December 2025)

This Secondary Holiday Camp takes students through today's biggest environmental challenges and the creative solutions shaping our future. Across five days, learners explore climate change, plastic waste, and biodiversity loss, then move on to solutions like eco-friendly schools, upcycling, and sustainable food. The course develops critical thinking, teamwork, and persuasive communication, and concludes with a lively Room 101 – Environmental Edition debate where students decide which issues to "banish" forever. Combining academic challenge with collaborative projects, the camp inspires learners to think globally and act locally as responsible citizens.

Week 3: Words That Win – An Essay Writing Course (8 to 12 December 2025)

This course develops students' ability to plan, organise, and write effective essays. Over the week, learners will practise analysing questions, writing introductions with strong thesis statements, structuring body paragraphs with supporting evidence, and crafting counterarguments and conclusions. They will also refine their editing and redrafting skills, ensuring clarity, cohesion, and confidence in academic writing.

Week 4: Teens Mean Business (15 to 19 December 2025)

This dynamic course focuses on building persuasive presentation skills and sharpening critical thinking. Students will study the stories of successful teen entrepreneurs, exploring what motivated them to start their own businesses and how they turned ideas into reality. They will gain practical knowledge of entrepreneurship, from generating business ideas to writing a simple plan, before stepping into the role of young entrepreneurs themselves. Learners will practice pitching their ideas to potential investors, practise negotiation strategies, and use the language of business to make their case. Through engaging reading, viewing, and interactive tasks, students will also develop creativity, organisation, and confidence as communicators.
